


Community Ministry Connection & Justice by Tom Morgan

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION MAY 2024

Connection. Joy. Action. Justice. Community. Join us!

I really **love being with the kids on Sundays in RE**. They are thoughtful, funny, affectionate, curious. Some of them take time to warm up to things. Some jump right into things.

We always have a time when we light the chalice and share **Joys and Concerns**. We go around the circle and every person, child or adult, can share a joy and/ or a concern, or just put their stone by the candle in silence. This ritual is comforting in its consistency. AND the things that are shared matter. People talk of sick or dying relatives or pets, of being nervous about some upcoming thing, about the hardness of being at school sometimes, of loss, of sadness. The rest of us listen in silence and don't talk. That's how it works.

And then they (and I - I always share) speak of birthdays, games that were won, beautiful weather, upcoming trips, visitors soon to arrive, animals, holidays, and often ice cream. And we listen in silence and don't talk. That's how it works.

It's a rare treat, to get to talk and listen without having to rush somewhere, complete something, take notes, or solve the thing that is hard. We are just there for each other. One of my favorite UU things, lighting the chalice and sharing.

I also love that RE is such a mixture of **serious reflection and ideas AND zaniness**. Jetpig is sometimes funny but they are also taken seriously by the kids. On Jetpig Sundays, the younger kids pass Jetpig around the circle as each person talks. We had to come up with a system to deal with so many people wanting to hold Jetpig.

We talk about interdependence – how we must rely on each other, how we affect each other and are affected by each other – and then we build ridiculously tall things out of straws and we don't snap when someone breaks it by accident.



Doing Social Hour a few Sundays ago, with some of the kids and parents, was so FUN. The kids took the **labeling of items** VERY SERIOUSLY, even if we couldn't tell what something was. Several kids ran the **industrial dishwasher** that most of the adults don't know how to use yet. (It's easy! All of you can help do dishes after Social Hour sometime!)

The kids bring me joy, even when they are sharing hard things, because I feel hopeful when I'm with them. If there are kids/people like this, the world won't completely go down the tubes. They are a remedy to doomscrolling and anxiety. I am aware that this would be different if some of these kids were my OWN kids that I was raising all the time. That's a harder thing, though it still has times of great hope and zaniness.

I hope you all will come to our annual RE Sunday on May 19 and celebrate our heart-filled kids and the teens and adults who hang out with them at RE.

May "Share the Plate" Donee: Gather (Drop-In Community Space)

Gather is a comfortable, welcoming, and freeof-charge gathering place that serves the neighborhood. Gather is a comfort zone for every-



one, but especially those who deal with isolation, loneliness, or who could just use a listening friend. It is a hub of healing community. While not a church or temple, Gather is based on some important Buddhist principles, because it is a project created by Bread Loaf Mountain Zen Community. Gather is located in the town center of Middlebury, on the Green.

Gather offers opportunities for each of us to meet new people, welcome everyone right where they are, and engage in mutual hospitality. Additionally, Gather offers ... daily midday mindfulness (12-12:20, closed Mon & Tues), music jams each Saturday morning (11-1:30), a circle of joys and concerns each Sunday (9-10 am), ongoing conversations over coffee, cake and healthy snacks, all-day weekly or bi-weekly card game events, grief groups, community celebrations, recovery meetings, community acupuncture, hand reflexology, art and quilting activities, knitting and rock painting classes, and so much more. All is free.







weeded, picked up sticks and debris, washed north Sanctuary wall outside to remove green,


